Welcome to ComFest 2018

Welcome to ComFest! You're participating in what is either a dated relic of the 1960s maintained by a bunch of aging radicals and hippies, or an open and generous celebration of how a community respects the differences of its members. Or maybe even something else.

The answer may depend on your implicit biases and what you want a festival to be.

ComFest began in 1972 as Community Festival, an artistic and political celebration of alternatives to mainstream culture. It grew from an early coalition of counter-cultural organizations—food co-op, health center, tenants union, underground newspaper, and phone information center—addressing needs not being met by the larger culture. Working with owners of small businesses such as import and clothing stores, ceramic artists, head shops, and jewelers, the group organized a two-day festival at 16th & Waldeck in the OSU area.

The principles around which the coalition organized remain the guiding ideals of ComFest (read them on page 9). They define the festival's continuing focus on progressive social change.

The five years preceding the first festival were some of the most tumultuous in the 20th century, and it's worth considering the insights and lessons nearly half a century can provide. Fifty years ago, 1968 was a pivotal year in American politics and culture, and there are some similarities with 2018.

Student protests. Military actions abroad. Attacks on civil rights. Police abuses. White supremacists. Increasing drug use. Black athletes protesting discrimination. Environmental devastation. Seismic changes in the status and power of women.

Broad coalitions of groups addressing varied issues (what some called The Movement) created a powerful image that inspired many to be part of something larger than themselves. Yes, there was friction and often conflict. But an ideal larger than Self—compassion? love?—compelled people to see their own humanity in the pain and struggles of others, and to take responsibility for others and take up the work necessary to create change. Poet Rebecca Baggett wrote, "...anyone who notices the world / must want to save it." These people noticed.

We're in a comparable historic moment (in which truth itself is under attack by a major political party). Given the Trump administration's tax breaks for millionaire friends and businesses, limits on health care, and corporate appointees trashing crucial government departments that affect all of us, it's not a stretch to see 2018 as a reboot of 1968's "Night of the Living Dead."

The momentum of women who have driven #MeToo and brave #NeverAgain students shows the power of unified action to shape social change. Yet the diversity of progressive groups makes them highly susceptible to division and alienation. It is easy for small differences to become battle lines. But our differing approaches to tactics do not make us enemies. Our passion for justice can become the passion of anger born of frustration. Benjamin Franklin noted during the American Revolution, "We must, indeed, all hang together, or most assuredly we will all hang separately."

We must, as this year's ComFest slogan says, Stand Together. If we do this, we can find ways to realize that each of us is a work-in-progress and that no individual or group has a monopoly on truth.

In a time when many show understanding of gender fluidity and ambiguity, we often lose sight of nuance and retreat into binary thinking about issues — an either/or approach that denies the complicated nature of problems and undermines real progress. Like gender identity, political issues are painfully complex and frequently don't have simple definitions or solutions.

Working for incremental change through compromise is not selling out; actively confronting power structures is not an attack on allies. Our differences are not betrayals, and they're not failures of commitment to whatever cause is at issue. They are a manifestation of the difficult reality that we are complex creatures continually weighing our personal needs against those of larger social entities.

Building and sustaining a community takes work that includes both struggle and celebration. ComFest combines these elements as part of the multi-dimensional nature of lives that acknowledge the political in the personal.

Civil society is built by interacting with neighbors, doing good work (regardless of status), patronizing small businesses, joining others in common endeavors, participating in church, community, political, and sports activities. These acts reinforce our interdependence. When we see others' well-being as part of our own, we build community.

This sharing in determining our lives is a sharing of our lives. It is the foundation of democracy. "Peace and love" is less a piece of easy snark than it is a description of a worthy, attainable goal and the admittedly difficult means for getting there.

Much of what ComFest's founders agitated for has become mainstream, but the forces created and unearthed by the 2016 election have made clear that there is plenty still to be done: confronting racism, opposing militarism, protecting public lands and the environment, resisting attacks on health care, preserving reproductive rights, and developing laws and coherent programs to replace a system geared to the benefit of the few.

ComFest is grounded in the idea that people with widely varying lifestyles and beliefs—humanity—can co-exist in harmony and struggle together to build a community that emphasizes tolerance, peace, and social justice. What you see around you is a partial realization of that idea. Maintaining it, in fact and philosophy, is a group project.

This is not complicated. Become an active part of ComFest: volunteer, together with friends. Then make your voice heard, not just on Facebook or Twitter, but in the streets, in your neighborhood—together. Take action. Vote. Look for what needs to be done. Then do it. Together.

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STAND TOGETHER

This year's ComFest volunteer T-shirts carry a message that's simple, but urgent: STAND TOGETHER.

What makes this slogan so timely is the daily outrage of an administration that sells American policy to the highest bidder, accommodates criminals both domestic and foreign, and undermines basic democratic norms while gutting essential federal services and risking international conflagration.

To accomplish this, both American capitalists and Russian oligarchs chose the same strategy: divide and conquer.

Divisiveness and polarization are everywhere. Contentiousness and belligerence seem the only personality options imaginable to some people. Others who had treasured their insular subcultures are realizing there's no separate peace to be had when the mass culture is on fire.

Splits between allies, among neighbors, family and friends are spreading like Kilauea's fissures, spewing poisonous

gasses and molten bedrock, changing the landscape of our common ground beyond recognition.

There's something ugly growing in the culture something cynical and quick to blame, something that wants to win at any cost, something willing to forfeit our common future for personal triumph.

Distrust of institutions, including the press, creates a miasma of Fear, Uncertainty and Doubt in which economic frustrations are misdirected and weaponized, turning allies into enemies. Racism grows bold. Cruelty spreads.

None of this is accidental. Well-funded dirty tricksters are doing everything possible to divide Americans against each other. Disinformation campaigns use what their purveyors call "military-grade influencer marketing" and "voter disengagement services" to destabilize even the idea of verifiable fact.

But in the face of constant manipulative pressures, progressives have a powerful tool: UNITY.

Massive, history-making demonstrations by women in January and students in April pushed their demands onto the national agenda by dint of sheer numbers. And the primary elections made obvious that a new wave of candidates and a new progressive agenda are gaining serious traction.

There are more women running for office this year than ever before, and many are expected to win. The 2018 bumper crop of progressive candidates share the support of organizations like Brand New Congress, Justice Democrats, Our Revolution and other national groups working to make meaningful endorsements, raise funds and get out the vote.

> Labor, traditionally the backbone of the progressive movement, is undergoing a renewal as well, led again by young people and women. *The Nation* wrote, "A movement that we're used to thinking of as getting older and smaller is actually growing stronger and younger."

> Teachers in WV, KY, NC, OK, AZ and CO walked out by the tens of thousands in state-

Photo by Michael Gruber wide protests and strikes that held the line for up to nine days. By standing together, they won better pay for themselves and better funding for schools, and showed everybody else how it's done.

At the same time, the new Poor People's Campaign is challenging activists to center their work on a moral obligation to end poverty, and to make a commitment to nonviolent civil disobedience as a necessary tactic.

And week in and week out, INDIVISIBLE chapters in every Congressional district continue to reinvigorate the practice of participatory democracy, keeping up-close pressure on legislators to move the progressive agenda.

Unity forged in action—marching, lobbying, phone banking—is building the base for a reversal of the predations of the Trump era.

If popular movements like #MeToo and #NeverAgain can grow from reactive, ephemeral hugfests to intentional and principled unity, if these intense new activists can build sustainable organizations and strategic coalitions, the peoples' movement for justice will be unstoppable.

As an alternative, they created RestoreCBUS, which uses group conversations to resolve disputes and avert violent escalations and deadly confrontations with police. Her organization was also able to convince the General Assembly to pass HB 410, which combats high school

relationship between law enforcement, lawmakers, and the low-income communities they serve.

Amber is the Director of Organizing and Policy for the Juvenile Justice Coalition (JJC), where she serves multiple roles as a community organizer, lobbyist, and at times guardian angel for atrisk youth in central Ohio. She is also lead organizer with the People's Justice Project.

Since 2015, she's been a familiar face on the 5th floor of the Franklin County courthouse, where she supports young people as they are ushered through a complex system of detention centers. children's services, and drop-out recovery programs for crimes related to poverty. This is part of her larger



philosophy, which is that to effectively create change in marginalized communities, organizers must be directly affected by the issues at hand and co-create space for developing leaders.

Her approach has paid off and gained her national recognition. Since joining JJC, she has increased the organization's 2015 roster of 20 young activists willing to attend rallies or City Council meetings to over 300 people across five chapters. JJC's youth organizing alliance, Voices of the Unheard, worked with People's Justice Project to end the 2017 "Summer Community Safety Initiative" in which police selectively targeted youth in minority communities.

dropout rates by requiring schools to take a less punitive approach to truancy.

The Director of the Juvenile Justice Coalition, Erin Davies, believes Amber has the potential to profoundly redefine organizing work through her rare ability to "pull threads together from her many experiences and backgrounds to create a single, very effective, organizer."

Amber grew up the oldest of six in a low-income community on the north side. Like many in her generation, she first began organizing in the wake of the 2008 fiscal crisis and Black Lives Matter movement. In 2011 she joined Occupy OSU, a student-led group that spoke out against growing income Photo by Michael Gruber inequality. The group later evolved into the Ohio Student

Association, which worked to halt a state takeover of the Columbus School Board and the passage of a Stand Your Ground bill in the wake of Trayvon Martin's killing.

After graduation she was motivated by her childhood love of her local library, a true community center, to obtain her Masters in Library Science.

"Society cannot continue to isolate groups of people based on historic prejudices," she says. "I am committed to organizing a powerful alliance that will reconstruct governance for the sake of rebuilding an Ohio for all people." ComFest is proud to acknowledge her as 2018's Honored Community Activist.

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Educate – Advocate – Vote

In almost every election there is one winner. It is not the Democrats, Republicans or any third political party. It is the the Party of Non-Voters. Those not voting make up the largest single group in almost every election.

Non-voters see themselves as not making a choice but the very act of non-participation has more influence on the election than anyone going into the voting booth.

The number of non-voters in the 2016 presidential election was greater than any of the votes the three national candidates received.

The largest group of nonvoters are those below the age of 29. If these voters, who have a remarkably different view of the world than older voters, came out in any significant numbers results of many elections would change.

In the 2016 presidential election: voters over 65 voted at a rate of 70 percent, 45-64 at 66 percent, 30-44 at 58 percent and those under 29 at 46 percent rate.

Voting drops for those under 29 by more than half, to a mere 16-20 percent in midterm elections like 2018.

In the three closest swing states in 2016, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin the presidential race was decided by 77,000 votes or 0.6% of the votes cast in those states.

A March Gallup poll said women and young voters will decide the 2018 midterm election.

Therefore, it is no coincidence that the attempts to influence the 2016 presidential election played out on social media sites like Facebook, Twitter and Reddit.

Most people under the age of 30 say they get their news from these sites. They were being targeted because as a group they are known as irregular voters, voters who do not go to the polls for every election.

So seeding distrust through misinformation and fake news stories was meant to keep young people from the polls. By setting false equivalents, young voters were being told there was no difference between the parties making voting a waste of time at best or collusion with a broken system at worst.



The students from Marjory Stoneman Douglas H.S. in Parkland Florida understand that the importance of young voters going to the polls is at the heart of changing the system.

As Emma Gonzalez said, talking about how politicians discount students and other young people, "Us kids don't know what we're talking about, that we're too young to understand how the government works. We call BS."

"If you agree, register to vote. Contact your local congresspeople. Give them a piece of your mind."

The crowd broke out in chants of "Throw them out." This is why this year's beer mug slogan is EDUCATE, ADVOCATE, VOTE

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HONORED COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION Indivisible Columbus

When the dark cloud of authoritarianism and its fellow traveler, intolerance, rolled over our country in the form of the election of Donald Trump, a groundswell of grassroots resistance rose under the banner of the Indivisible movement.

In the Columbus area, Indivisible groups sprang up and linked with existing progressive organizations to oppose the Trump agenda. In the short time since Trump ascended to the Presidency, Indivisible Columbus groups have established themselves with a speed, purpose,

and effectiveness that warranted their selection as 2018 ComFest Honored Community Organization.

Indivisible Columbus includes district-based groups working to influence specific legislators or races while others, such as the Clintonville Area Progressives, include the Indivisible ethos in their existing environmental, economic, and social justice goals. Last year Indivisible Columbus presented a ComFest workshop called "Indivisible: How to Get Involved 101."

The Indivisible movement began nationally

with the development of the *Indivisible: A Practical Guide for Resisting the Trump Agenda*, by former congressional staffers. The guide outlined how to effectively influence elected officials. In central Ohio, John Gatiss, Kimberly Morgan, and others set the groundwork for Indivisible Columbus, holding the first meetings, setting up the website, and dividing into district groups. Their efforts were aided by current Indivisible OH12 leadership team members Mia Lewis and Sara Samson.

When asked about her involvement, Mia Lewis said, "After Trump was elected, I felt I had to do something. Our elected representatives have lost their way morally and ethically. We are trying to hold our legislators accountable and oppose the Trump agenda."

Indivisible Columbus groups use a variety of approaches, from protests to after-work social events that include writing letters to Congressional representatives. "We try to make small changes," Sara Sampson added, "to get people involved in calling their legislators, in meeting and testifying."

The group has already made a huge impact with its support of the Fair Districts = Fair Elections campaign.

Circulating petitions for what became State Issue 1, the successful anti-gerrymandering constitutional amendment, volunteers collected their first signatures last year at the Columbus Arts Festival, Pride, and ComFest.

"That gave us a good start toward success," Sara Sampson stated. "I'm proud of all the work we did on gerrymandering."

Indivisible OH 12 also claims victory in its opposition to US Representative Pat Tiberi, who is supporting a Tea Party candidate in the fall

election. Mia Lewis noted, "We protested outside Tiberi's office for 50 weeks until he resigned and will hold the next office holder accountable."

Indivisible OH 12's efforts earned them a say in the Democratic Party's endorsement process for that seat.

Indivisible Columbus still has goals to accomplish. They continue to act in support of the Affordable Care Act and remind Senator Rob Portman of his duty to his constituents. "We are supporting good candidates in Licking and Delaware counties," Mia Lewis said.

COMFEST HONORED ARTIST Allen Zak

Allen Zak lit out for California in 1962 in search of, he says, "adventure, romance, and movie stars." And though he had caught the shutter bug at 16, he

didn't know he'd become a professional photographer when he went west.

Along the way, Allen witnessed the first of two life-shaping events: in a hotel office he watched as a black man was denied a room. "We're not integrated here," said the clerk.

Zak took a job in LA with the real estate maintenance department of a savings and loan. During the evaluation of a foreclosed property, he encountered a shoeless African-American boy. Asked why he wasn't in school, the kid replied that he shared one pair of shoes with his brother, so they alternated days going to class.

"The kid tipped it for me," said Zak.

He became an organizer and activist, helping lead demonstrations sympathetic

to Martin Luther King, Jr.'s activities. In March, 1965, he made a commitment that would shape his career: traveling across the country to Selma, Alabama to join 600 marchers led by Dr. King on their way to the state capital in Montgomery to stand for voting rights.

"He boarded a Greyhound with \$12 and six rolls of film," according to a Columbus Dispatch feature in 2015, "curling up for the grueling 1,800 mile trip."

Catching sleep where he could and borrowing film from other photographers, he shot more than 200 pictures, many of them images that have become identified with the event. Allen's friend Mack Crawford spotted him in a vintage clip in the recent film "Selma," power-napping by the side of the road.

The ongoing struggle for justice wasn't news to the photographer, whose mother was an outspoken Communist. Likely, it shaped his career commitment to

> the causes of labor and social justice organizations.

Neither is he a stranger to the spirit of conciliation. His father, a life-long Republican, met his mother at a Communist social. Allen attributes his belief in the possibilities of consensus to that upbringing.

Zak's work has graced Rolling Stone, The Washington Post, Time, and Newsweek, among others. He was a staffer at the legendary "underground paper" Los Angeles Free Press and has shot famous people including Angela Davis and Andy Warhol.

Allen met his wife Leslie, herself a "red-diaper baby," while in Los Angeles. The couple moved to Columbus in 1975, attending Community Festival for the first time the next summer.

His work is a chronicle of his own humanity and

dedication to social justice.

"His images from the front lines of the civil rights movement captured the determination of people in their struggle for freedom and justice," said fellow photographer and ComFest volunteer Michael Gruber.

"Allen-and Leslie-got me engaged in civic action," remembered longtime friend Debbie Crawford, who met the couple in 1984.

ComFest program writer Marty Stutz captured Allen Zak's place in Columbus: "Our community is fortunate to count Allen Zak as a neighbor, artist and activist."

COMFEST HONORED VOLUNTEER Bryan Hartley

Before thousands descend on Goodale Park to celebrate ComFest, a dedicated team of volunteers comes together to—literally—assemble the festival.

ComFest Logistics volunteers are responsible

for transforming the park into a secure, safe and manageable small village. That means transporting and putting up tents and fencing, supplying water and moving hundreds of tables, chairs and other supplies into place.

Bryan Hartley has emerged as a highly regarded leader on the Logistics Committee, assuming ever-increasing responsibilities over several years to ensure everything is in place in the days leading up to Friday morning. For his tireless efforts, ComFest recognizes Bryan as a 2018 Honored Volunteer.

The heavy lifting, largely unnoticed by ComFest attendees, is crucial to putting on the city's best community event.

Bryan began attending ComFest in 1994 and was hooked right away. For several years he worked with Ryan Stevens, who

operated the BurritoBago food booth, a mainstay at ComFest and music festivals around the country.

Bryan's first experience as a ComFest volunteer was in 2006 when he signed on as a Food Fairy. He enjoyed Friday mornings at the shelter house preparing meals for volunteers. The job also provided the opportunity to meet "the elders," as Bryan describes longtime ComFest organizers.

Bryan quickly sought other volunteer opportunities and today is responsible for the logistics map, which lays out where everything needs to go during festival set-up. "Bryan is a remarkable person," said Candy Watkins. "His creativity and energy level are amazing. He gives his all to each project."

"It's hard work, of course," Bryan says, "but I also

get to drive 70 or 80 golf carts off the truck and over to the shelter house. That's a lot of fun."

He oversees a crew of about 12 when they start moving everything in on Tuesday and Wednesday. By Thursday evening when streets are shut down and vendors are setting up, he may need up to 30 or more.

Bryan is motivated in part by seeing so many people enjoy the festival. "It's satisfying that, because of all our hard work, so many other people can have a great time," he said.

His work doesn't end with setting up the festival. All weekend Bryan operates his food booth The Love Bug in Peace Village, which he helped to build up by recruiting other vendors into the area.

His spirit of generosity and volunteerism can be found at his booth. Bryan has invited crew members to his booth and cooked for them.

"ComFest is a big part of our community," he said. "It's great for the community to come together and so important that everything is done by volunteers."

Bryan is also important to the future of the ComFest as a member of the next generation to carry on the festival.

"I don't ever see myself not being a part of Comfest," he said.

That's good news. And as Bryan's friend Rob Schorr said upon learning about his recognition: "Now you've done it, boy," he said. "You're stuck for life!"

Keep ComFest Clean And Green Respect the Party by Respecting the Park

Community Festival is a fantastic party, but every year thousands of pounds of trash are left behind. In 2017, ComFesters generated 12 tons of trash. Festivalgoers and Clean-Up and Recycling volunteers worked together to save 6 tons of recyclable materials.and compost 2.12 tons of material.

Try to purchase what you can consume so less waste is created, and take home what you can and compost at home.

ComFest shopping bags are for sale at the ComFest Booth. Use them for your ComFest gear and festival purchases. Continue to use them year-round at the grocery store.

Please help us become a zerowaste festival. Increased cleanup demands require more time and volunteers, so please do your part: clean up after yourself and volunteer to help clean up the park. Volunteers of all ages are welcome.

Clean-Up and Recycling In 2018

We plan to use clear stream containers from SWACO. These will replace the cardboard boxes used in the past. The clear stream approach makes it easier to see where recy-

clables go versus trash. Hopefully this will lead to greater number of recycled materials. Enjoy ComFest more by following a few simple guidelines:

1. LEAVE NO TRACE Treat ComFest as a wilderness and leave nothing behind but your footprints. Use the trash and recycling bins. Pick up after your messy neighbor and your dog (ComFest is barefoot-friendly, after all!). This is the most important contribution you can make. If we each do a little more, no one has to do a lot. **2. VOLUNTEER** for a four-hour Clean-Up and Recycling shift. You'll receive a unique T-shirt and chips good for ComFest food and refreshments. Sign up at *comfest.com*, or go to Vlunteer Central or Merch-inTeer booths and they'll point you in the right direction. Volunteers are especially needed for night shifts. Ask about volunteer opportunities for community organizations.

3. DON'T BE A GLASSHOLE Glass containers are never allowed in the park. Broken glass is dangerous. Glass is heavy and adds to cleanup costs. Please don't bring glass into the park.

4. RECYCLE your #1 and #2 plastic beverage containers. Please empty the contents and flatten items if you can. Clearly marked containers are located throughout the park.

5. NO BYOB This is the number one way to reduce tons of trash and recycling. You can make ComFest cleaner and more environmentally friendly by leaving plastic, glass, and aluminum at home. Buy ComFest beverages and support the festival.

6. TELL US if our recycling or trash boxes are full. Clean-Up and Recycling headquarters is north of the Bozo Stage near the Shelter House.

7. RESPECT THE PARK Goodale Park is YOUR park. This 40-acre site is a gift from Dr. Lincoln Goodale, so please treat it gently.

For 46 years, Community Festival has promoted environmental awareness as a part of its celebration. Dedication to recycling and composting has always gone hand-in-hand with cleanup. Please help when and where you can!

Libations – Local Brews

This year, ComFest has made our beer selections 100% local. After seeing the growth of local brewers—Four String Brewing Co. and Columbus Brewing Company—we saw an opportunity to take it all local. Both brewers expressed their love of ComFest and embraced the opportunity to be part of our move to 100% local.

We feel this brings more quality craftsmanship to our taps from local brewers. The success of Hilltop Lager and Hilltop Light from Four String opened the door to offer these two local options as an alternative to the previous selections from large domestic brewers. These beers, coupled with IPA, Summerteeth and Thunderlips from Columbus Brewing Company, will provide a wide selection of flavors for attendees.

A special treat for beer lovers is the ComFest Kolsch. It was brewed in limited quantities and. it's a collaboration beer with 2 Tones Brewing Company, Sideswipe Brewing and Combustion Brewing. It takes local to a new level. It is brewed using locally sourced and donated malted barley from Rustic Brew Farm in Marysville, Ohio. Dry hopped Kolsch is a light hybrid beer. It's citrusy, crisp and refreshing.

For those who imbibe from the fruits of the vine, we offer some new wines to satisfy your palette—Old Soul Chardonnay and Pinot Grigio. To complement these try a glass of Frances Ford Coppola Pinot Grigio or Rosso Red Blend. The Rosso is made from Zinfandel, Cabernet Sauvignon and Syrah—smooth and not too sweet. All of these choices are available at the Off Ramp and Jazz bars as well as the wine booth on Park Street.

There are currently four festival bars:

Peace Village: Our newest location that premiered in 2017 has expanded this year and now offers both beer and mixed drinks. Located in the northwest area of the park east of the Dennison Avenue parking lot.

Lincoln: Offering beer only. It's the first booth on the north end of Park Street near Lincoln Alley.

Jazz: Offering beer, wine and mixed drinks. Find it at the corner of Park St and Goodale St.

Off Ramp: Offering beer and wine. on Goodale St. next to the Off Ramp Stage.

Remember to have your ID ready. Every bartender will ask to see it and will examine it carefully. All ages are treated the same. No ID means no service, no matter your age.

HONORED COMFEST VOLUNTEER Meghan Ralston

"I don't want to be one of the people who just wants to help themselves," Meghan Ralston says, "I want to be the one who helps others."

A Columbus native, Ralston attended her first ComFest as an 18-year-old freelance photographer, working for local bands who hired her to capture images

of them as they performed at the festival. Soon, Ralston would become an award-winning photojournalist, an authority on Columbus' diverse music scene, and a standout ComFest volunteer who is helping to shape the future of the festival.

"I just kind of wandered into it by accident," Ralston says. She began volunteering at the band merch booth, but she was also curious about the how the entertainment schedule was determined. This led her to volunteer with the Entertainment Committee, of which she is now a co-head and the Off-Ramp Stage manager. "It's a very visible presence at the festival, and the ability to

try to program diverse music that will appeal to a diverse group of people is a challenge that I enjoy," she says.

She quickly gained recognition for her work ethic and enthusiasm. Darryl Mendelson, longtime festival organizer says, "The first time I met Meghan was when she joined the Entertainment Committee. Her impact there was tremendous." Mendelson continues, "She has made the Off-Ramp stage relevant and has brought in a lot of new, young diversity."

Ralston has a passion for ensuring that ComFest's Entertainment Committee showcases talent that truly reflects the community in which we live. In the past four years, the festival has offered more hip-hop entertainers than ever, including the late rapper Sheron "Nes Words" Colbert, who electrified the Off-Ramp stage last year. "I have never been so happy to give someone two more minutes on stage," Ralston reflects, "because it was his last performance."

Ralston also serves on the Sprit and Purpose Committee, where she organizes photographers and videographers as well as coordinating content for workshops. "To me, it's kind of the heartbeat of the

whole festival," she says. Making a concerted effort to offer programs to train social justice activists and teaching people how to practice self-care is an integral part of ComFest.

"I see Spirit and Purpose as being who we are and Grants as what we do," Ralston says. Every year, ComFest's Grants Committee donates thousands of dollars to community organizations. There is a wide variety of organizations and projects that align with ComFest's principles. Ralston has served on the committee for the past three years and helped to modernize the grant application process, making it completely paperless. She continues, "The ability to put any

funding towards those projects and

rse the ability to help them in any possible way is the biggest payoff."

The modernization and design of ComFest's web page was also managed by Ralston. Jerod Keron, who volunteers with Ralston on the Technology Committee says, "She overcomes obstacles, gets things done, and has been an intricate part of many of the positive changes within the Community Festival organization."

Ralston has made a deep impact with her energy and mentorship. Longtime festival organizer Lu Brammer says, "You can always find Meghan providing assistance to most anyone. She seamlessly steps into supporting roles for most every committee." She continues, "To sum up Meghan: she is one dependable, fair, empathic, intelligent and delightful being."

"She's collected and consistent," John Gurney says of Carrie, noting that she participates in committee meetings throughout the year via Skype.

Carrie appreciates that the festival has remained committed to its founding Principles and addresses political issues that continue to exist today.

IN MEMORIAM

The last year has taken a heavy toll on several of the volunteers, activists and entertainers who gave their passion, talent and vision to make their mark on ComFest and the wider Columbus community. The following have left us but their memories will remain to sustain us as we head into another year. We remember and honor those who have made our community a better place though their talents and giving spirit.



John Vogel was around in the early days of ComFest when Community Festival was a small street festival at 16th and Waldeck Avenues.

More recently he volunteered with the Archives Committee and helped develop the ComFest Museum.

John worked closely with Jodi Kushins accumulating and sorting pieces of ComFest history. "Through our work together on the archives, John and I really got to know one another. We would sit around for hours listening to old records while reading through old campus area newsletters, campaign posters, photos, and ComFest programs. John was proud of the work we did together and with festival founders and long-time organizers," Jodi recalled.

Known as "Wahl" by many, John graduated from Ohio State University and was past president of the Columbus Landscape Association. He was a skilled and knowledgeable landscape horticulturist who loved soulful music, delicious food and big stories.



Tom Harker,

better known as "UkuleleMan" was an activist entertainer whose wit and way with words brought smiles to people's faces while delivering political messages. Tom was a regular performer at ComFest, wearing colorful Hawaiian shirts while skilfully strumming his ukulele.

Tom brought his political opinions to the printed pages of numerous letters to the editor and guest columns. Tom always believed that individual action could make the world a little less crazy and a better place for all.

Tom .studied English and Psychology at Ohio State and then was an educator for thirty-one years. While teaching in Circleville, Ohio he led the teachers union and stood up for both teachers and student rights.

Tom's voice and music live on in his CD's of original music, YouTube videos and two books of music and poetry.



Margaret "Peg" Stansbery was honored as an activist by ComFest along with her husband Les. They were tireless in their activism and their

lifelong dedication to peace and justice. She was one who definitely practiced thinking globally while acting locally.

Peg loved her teaching career dedicating twenty-seven years in the Columbus City School District. She took pride as an educator as well as being a union member.

Peg and Les met in Geneva while attending The Ecumenical Institute.

Her deep faith helped direct her lifelong commitment to work for justice for oppressed people. It also led to 60years of marriage to Les.

Peg's work promoting education is carried on through an endowment fund in her memory through The Community Organizing Center, 1001 Bryden Rd., Columbus, Ohio 43205-1821.



Mary Beittel was another half of a dynamis activist team honored as community activists by ComFest. Mary, with her husband Kent, were

dedicated to improving the lives of some of Columbus' most vulnerable individuals. For over three decades she and Kent founded and managed the Open Shelter in its various locations. Mary gave her insight, wisdom, resources and respect through her compassionate work with and for our homeless citizens.

Faith was an important element of Mary's life. In a Sunny 95 interview Mary said: "I do what I do because it is who I am." "My faith sustains me and the generosity of the community makes our work possible." She was involved with the Broad Street United Methodist Church where she served as treasurer for a number of years.

DonVoss Candy Watkins fondly remembers Don Voss as a lifelong friend and "an adventurer all his life. Anyone who knew him

also knew he was a ferocious defender of the environment." Don served on the Board of Northend Community Center Corporation – the organization that gave birth to Community Festival. He worked hard on the Northend recycling efforts.

Don's affection for the environment led him to Florida where he gained a master Captain's license. He chartered boats, accumulated scuba diving hours and became a Master Diver.

In 2001 Voss founded a group of divers who worked to remove trash from waterways.

Don's last visit to ComFest was just a few years ago. He had a wonderful time visiting and sharing the tales of his work and experiences.

Bob Weld staffed the Dennison parking lot each day all day during ComFest and did a great job.\

Bob's passionate activism was his fuel. He worked for Ohio Citizen Action for nine years and volunteered with the Democratic Party through many election cycles. For the last ten years he worked in the south end of Columbus as a grassroots coordinator for the Get Out The Vote efforts.

Bob put his signature on many petitions that sought to call out the onerous actions of the Ohio legislature. Allen Ahrens was a longtime Safety Base volunteer at ComFest. His most prized possession was the collection of ComFest volunteer T-shirts he had accumulated.

Allen was a lover of history and good food. He attended over 100 Grateful Dead concerts and was known to enjoy singing and karaoke.

Allen's friends knew him as a gentle, sweet, kind and genuine friend loved by many. The last few years were a challenge for Allen. No matter how he felt, it was his goal to make it to ComFest.

After he lost his battle with cancer friends said "a mighty oak has fallen."

Tom Grace was a volunteer at ComFest First Aid. He was a Registered Nurse and retired from Twin Valley Behavioral Center. Tom was an Army veteran who served during the Vietnam War.

Tom was a healing force at the First Aid booth. He was both knowledgeable and compassionate. He will be missed.



Sheron "Nes Wordz" Colbert "Nes Wordz" was an educator and a premier hip-hop and rap artist in Columbus who passed away 4 days after his final

performance as headliner Saturday night at the Off Ramp Stage last year. For the past few years, Nes had been performing at the festival, headlining Saturday night on the Bozo Stage in 2016. What most don't know about were his quieter contributions to the festival – like in the Entertainment Committee where he helped with selection of rap and hip-hop performers for multiple years, or the time he and Dominique Larue cleaned up an entire stage by themselves in 2015.

Dressed in all white, surrounded by his friends and fellow artists on stage all dressed in black, Nes almost glowed as he worked Off-Ramp, his powerful performance engaged the crowd. They sang his lyrics back to him as Nes, friends, and crowd moved as one, as the stage itself bounced and bowed in his presence. When he came off stage, Nes looked satisfied, proud, and accomplished. "He gave me a big, sweaty hug, and we told each other how happy we were that the other was there. It was the normal love-fest that I had come to expect from him," said Off Ramp Stage Head Meghan Ralston, "I'll miss that most of all."

Mike Parks was one of Columbus's premier guitarists. His contributions to great music in Columbus date back to the 1960s. He played with lots of local bands including Willie Phoenix in the 1990s, Shakedown and The Godz. More recentlyhis guitar licks could be heard playing with The League Bowlers. His great spirit, talent and smile will be missed.

"Peace General" Bruce Duncan

was a longtime volunteer with the ComFest Archives Committee. He was at ComFest every year shooting video. He was a tireless activist who forged his own path and followed his convictions. "He was strongly dedicated to fighting injustice and for a world of peace," recalled Robb Ebright. Bruce used to say he wanted to "inspire people and wage peace at war's pace."

Relieve Dog Stress – Leave Them At Home

You may think your best friend likes outdoor festivals as much as you do. In reality, these are potentially hazardous to your dog, you, other festival-goers, and their dogs. Large events raise a dog's stress level and can make it unhappy and more likely to act in ways that can be unpleasant to others (while you're relaxing).

1. **NOISE**. Your dog's hearing is perhaps 10 times more sensitive than yours. Even if you aren't right in front of a live stage speaker, overall volume level, sound reverberation and sheer quantity of constant noise coming from all directions is potentially damaging to your dog's sensitive hearing. Guitar shredding can shred your dog's hearing.

2. HEAT AND FATIGUE.

When was the last time you went to a summer concert in a fur coat? Even when water and shade are available, heat can quickly dehydrate dogs and cause lifethreatening heat stroke. Taking a long walk around the neighborhood is one thing. Walking for hours on hot pavement or even grass is exhausting for a dog.

3. **CROWDS**. Being in a crowd makes a dog confused or anxious, so even

the best-behaved dogs stress out in crowds. Aside from crowded conditions and sensory overload, a lot is going on at knee level that you may not see, such as a toddler reaching to pet the dog's face. "But my dog would never bite..." may be true in ordinary calm situations, but a crowded event creates unpredictable conditions and serious risks. 4. **BITING**. All dog bites are required by law to be reported to the authorities. If your dog bites someone at ComFest and it does not have a current rabies vaccination tag and papers, it must be quarantined (confined) and observed for 10 days, even if it is a healthy dog. Also, there is little to stop your dog from catching a disease from another dog at ComFest. Be sure your dog is up to date on all of its vaccinations, especially rabies.

5. **FOOD DANGERS**. The ground is one big chow bowl to a dog. Peppery foods, sugary foods and onions are just part of the buffet only a few inches away from that big wet nose. Your dog could develop

pancreatitis. Often a direct result of such "dietary indiscretions," it can range from milder symptoms demanding care by a vet to severe and life-threatening problems requiring hospitalization, possible surgery, and hundreds of dollars of expense (your guilt aside).

6. **GETTING LOST**. Lost pets risk never being returned to their owners or, worse, being hit by a car. Be sure your dog is wearing some form of identification at all times.

Why would you bring your dog here? Taking your dog to any large outdoor event is

an ego trip at your dog to any farge outdoor event is an ego trip at your dog's expense. The only benefit to your dog is that Fido doesn't have to pick up your poop. Do your best friend a big favor: don't take your dog to ComFest or other crowded public events.

Every visitor to Community Festival is expected to observe public safety laws and event rules listed in the Program Guide.

Visitors to ComFest this year again should anticipate a police presence and enforcement of all applicable laws. ComFest has lots of signs warning visitors that there is a No BYOB rule in the park, and organizers want everyone to know that includes everything that is still illegal in Ohio. Safety/No BYOB teams patrol the park and take time to personally warn people and encourage lawful enjoyment of the festival.
